The Award Committee will select finalists. Nominators of finalists may be asked to submit additional information.

Through this recognition, we not only remember a key figure from our past, but also celebrate individuals who follow in Dr. Hubbard's footsteps through their own remarkable contributions.

Criteria for consideration includes outstanding achievement in one or more of the following areas:

- ▶ A substantial record of fostering the development of assessment methods and/or measurement techniques
- ▶ Personal contributions to basic or applied research in the creation or improvement of assessment methodology
- ▶ Accomplishment in improving the quality of assessment at an organizational level
- ► Contributions through the education or mentoring of students, colleagues, fellows, or graduate students, to further assessment research

(Recognition of contributions to medicine in curricular development, instructional methodology or medical training methods is not the primary purpose of the award.)
